feel guided to remind you, reader, that while your heart may be heavy with hurt, the real magic of Christmas is that we never have to endure it alone.

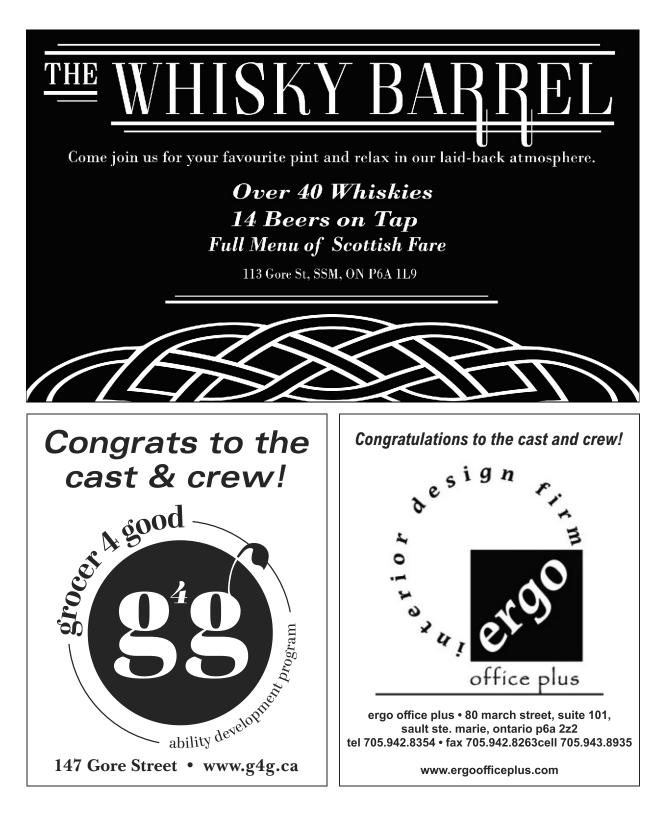

This House is Made of Moving Parts: a Defense of Community Theatre and the Performing Arts

So you packed your family into the minivan and drove, kicking and screaming, to watch a show at the local high school stage. Waited in line like a good kid, showed your tickets to the usher who led you

to your row of seats somewhere in the midline, and sat down. The auditorium is full of people looking for their seats. You stand up once, twice to let them by. A phantom hand rustles the curtain from backstage. You glance at the time and already regret not sitting closer to the aisle. The cushion of your seat could stand to be a bit comfier but it does it's job and gets paid. Just as your troop settles in and quiets down, the lights dim and so does the cacophony of chitchat surrounding you. The curtain rises, revealing the reason you came. Why is that?

Directing and producing theatre is like building a house. This building is achieved in stages (pun intended) through a rigorous cycle of rehearsal, revision, and repetition. Before this is a preconstruction period: rights are acquired and scene sketches are drawn up, casting calls go out to the public, auditions and callbacks take place, rehearsal space is either rented or donated, and a managing team is assembled. A muddy hole in the ground is where the work begins. The first stage commences and the foundation is laid. Then up goes the four corners of the house of theatre: time, body, voice, and movement. After a month of rehearsals, these begin to take shape.

Each return to the rehearsal space, something new has been added to the construction—buttresses, joists and beams. The next time, there are walls and window frames, a tall rectangle for the door, slowly but surely coming together. This is mise-en-scène.







The art of theatre is not one thing practiced to the point of exhaustion but rather multiple points of reference propelled forward all at once—that is what comes out on the stage opening night. What you are seeing, hearing, and feeling is a culmination of efforts from a dozen directions. The precise timing of an actor entering and leaving a scene, the position and angle of the body, the projection and intonation of the voice, and the coordination of movement through and around other moving actors are only part of the artform. Set design, costuming, lighting, and music are integral to the finished project.

Let's cut the fat and get to the dog with the bone: you came to take a break from the woes and harsh realities of real life but a house isn't always a home. The skills and abilities required to make theatre come alive are what make or break a production. Those skills are also universally transferable. Logistics isn't about the shortest path from point A to point B but the right path. The most effective route to a desired outcome is rarely as simple as the crow flies and such is only one of the tasks directors must solve for. The field of business and economics is about risk and opportunity. The idea could be solid, millions of dollars in value, but without the home-run pitch it's dead in the water. Theatre is the grand arena of human expression. In all walks of life, we are required to connect, communicate, and coordinate our efforts to create solutions and bridge gaps.

What you are about to witness is a masterclass in these principles.

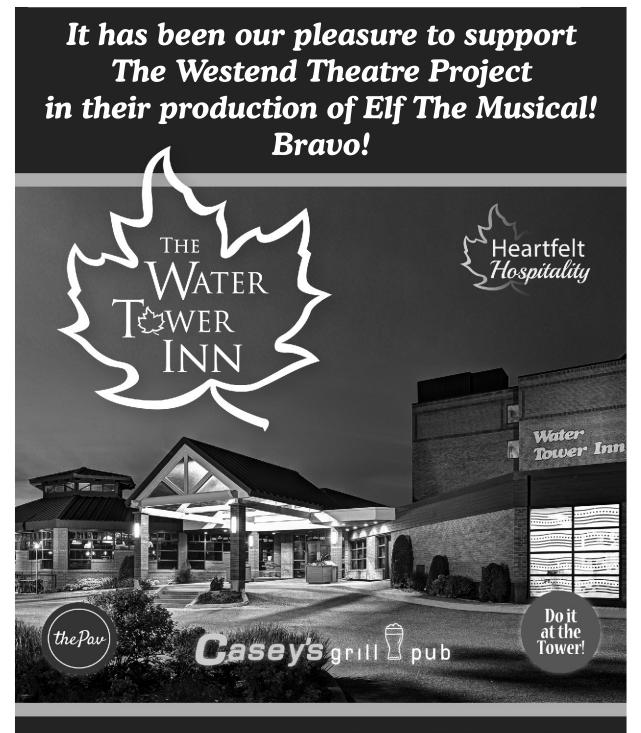
